## Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> March 2021 Third Sunday of Lent

I don't know about you but I've found Lockdown Three particularly hard. The days have been short, the weather cold and the news very depressing as the virus spread so rapidly once again. The death rate per 100,000 has been higher in the UK than any other country and passing that awful milestone of 100,000 Covid deaths was a sobering moment. The pressure on health and care staff, on clergy and families has been immense and our thoughts are especially with Allison and Bob with prayers for a speedy recovery. One of my daughters is a teacher in central London. Most of her children have been home schooling, some in difficult households with very little space. Two days a week she comes into school, the rest of the week she teaches children from home, on her laptop. Keeping up morale amongst them is a real problem and most carry a level of anxiety and worry about the future that she has not seen before.

We all long for hopeful news. The vaccine roll out is wonderful, but still the end doesn't quite seem to be in sight. Every day I scan the papers and listen to the news, but often things still sound so bleak. From where is our hope to come?

I'm reminded of verses from the well-known Psalm 121.

I lift up my eyes to the hills; from where is my help to come? My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth. He will not suffer your foot to stumble; he who watches over you will not sleep.



Many people have found solace and comfort in the natural world. 'Lifting up eyes to the hills' perhaps, but perhaps just treasuring a tree outside a window, or the changing sky from day to day. My daughter has discovered a love of birds, putting out crumbs each day outside her London basement flat and watching blue tits and robins come to pick them up. Nature reminds us that whatever our current problems, we are part of something bigger. Part of God's world, God's creation. Ultimately our help and our hope come from the Lord, 'the maker of heaven and earth.' And 'he who watches over you will not sleep.'

May that same Lord of heaven and earth hold you and keep you this day and always. Amen.

## Service of Holy Communion for the Third Sunday of Lent

#### Collect

Eternal God, give us insight to discern your will for us, to give up what harms us, and to seek the perfection we are promised in Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen** 



#### 1 Corinthians 1: 18-25

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, <sup>but</sup> we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, <sup>but</sup> to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

#### John 2: 13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.


### Additional Resources during Lockdown
